FUNDRAISER A HUGE SUCCESS FOR BETHESDA HOSPITAL

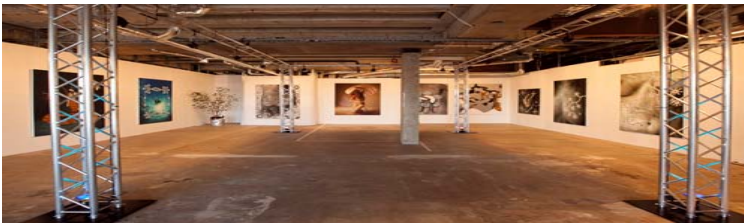

An outstanding art show featuring international artists, a fashion icon who had heard about Bethesda's palliative care services and was keen to share her endeavours from her foundation in New York, indigenous music and artists who had a connection with the Church of Christ ministry work in Looma, North West WA, and a crowd who were keen to hear of the hospital's history and future plans. A major donation from the Rhonda Wyllie Foundation was acknowledged on the evening with funds already committed to a beautiful refurbishment of the palliative care day room for patients. The unused space next to the Bethesda Café was transformed into an amazing art gallery, showcasing the Nomad Two Worlds art by international Perth-born and New York-based photographer

Russell James and indigenous artists. Over 200 guests enjoyed an evening of music, art and fundraising activities for Bethesda's Palliative Care Unit. PALLIATIVE CARE STAFF MEET WITH DONNA KARAN

On 16 November 2010, the Palliative Care Team at Bethesda met with international fashion designer and philanthropist Donna Karan to discuss how her Urban Zen Foundation in New York has funded an integrated therapy model in palliative care at the Beth Israel Hospital (NYC). Donna was immediately impressed with our PCU and commented that Bethesda had already made significant progress with care regimes. An important relationship with Donna Karan was established which will see the sharing of experiences, with the potential to introduce some new approaches.

The Meaning of the Christmas Tree...

The Christmas Tree is one of the most popular and cherished customs. There are some gorgeous Christmas Trees, but what is their real meaning and do they have any place in religion? Some Christians feel that since "Christmas Trees" are not biblically ordained, they should not be used. However, the Christmas Tree was adopted many years ago as a symbol for Christmas, initially starting out as a pagan custom which had nothing to do with Christianity, but because a tree is so beautiful when it is decorated, the custom stuck.

The earliest of an evergreen tree being used and decorated for Christmas is in 1521 in the German region of Alsace. The first Christmas Trees did not have lights; they did not appear until the 17th century.

Traditionally, Christmas Trees were not brought in and decorated until Christmas eve and then removed the day after the 12th night (6th January); to have a tree up before or after these dates was considered bad luck. Modern commercialisation has resulted in trees going into shops as early as late October!

However you view the Christmas Tree, enjoy their qualities.
